**THERE** are key issues which will determine the future of Belmont. Rapid Growth, Taxes and overcrowded Schools, This is how I intend on addressing each issue

#### **GROWTH:**

- (A) I will seek to incorporate into the Belmont City Code an Adequate Public Facilities Ordinance (APFO). Through this we can manage growth by linking it directly to the ability of the City to provide services.
- (B) A review of the "conditional use" provision in the building code. This currently allows too much latitude in construction and design which are not compatible with Belmont's traditional neighborhoods.
- (C) Require builders to contribute to infrastructure: police, fire, park & rec.
- (D) Support the land use plan.

#### TAXES:

- (A) Seek alternate revenue streams such as targeted user fees.
- (B) A review of all commercial and residential development fees to determine if any potential fees are not currently being collected.
- (C) To examine the option of "Inter-Governmental Agreements" with adjoining communities re: cost sharing in providing service or code enforcement personnel.
- (D) Address the practice of transferring public tax revenue to the private sector.

#### **SCHOOLS:**

- (A) Restructure the development/builder fee scale which would increase or decrease in relation to school capacity at time of application/permitting.
- (B) To investigate with the county the potential of having developers / builders cost share new school construction and/or donate land as a code requirement.
- (C) Encourage the county to incorporate a APFO county wide.
